In Memoriam: Horace Anderson “Jack” Smith

Jack Smith was born August 29, 1929 in McAdenville NC and died January 2, 2005 at Duke Health Raleigh Hospital. He was the son of Horace Abernethy Smith and Alma Hoffman Smith. Jack graduated from Shelby High School in 1947 and N.C. State College in 1951 with a degree in Agricultural Engineering. He then served two years in the Army Reserve, stationed in Germany for 15 months. He also joined the N.C. National Guard, completed 30 years of service, and retired as a Colonel. While in the service he received a Meritorious Service Medal. In 1953, Jack began a career in government. He worked in the State Department of Agriculture and the State Department of Conservation and Community Development and directed the State Soil and Water Conservation Committee. For a year he was director of the Wake County Natural Resources. He also served as

deputy secretary of the N.C. Department of Conservation and Development and directed the State Soil and Water Conservation Committee.

In 1978 he joined his wife in their family-owned management firm where he served as president until his retirement in 1992. During his retirement Jack enjoyed doing many things, including delivering mail at two Raleigh hospitals, working part-time in the legislative post office when the General Assembly was in session, delivering Meals on Wheels with his wife, and assisting some elderly friends.

Throughout his life, Jack was an active church member. Jack and Jo Ann were married at First Baptist Church in Raleigh on December 19, 1953. He was a member of Creedmore Road Baptist Church where he remained very active until his final illness.

Survivors include Jack’s wife, Jo Ann; sons, Andy and Doug Smith, and Jim Robinson; grandchildren Sarah Ellen Smith, Patrick Anderson Smith, and Samuel Troy Robinson; sister Dorothy Knowlton; aunt Faye Lineberger; and uncle E. B. Smith as well as many cousins and other loved ones.

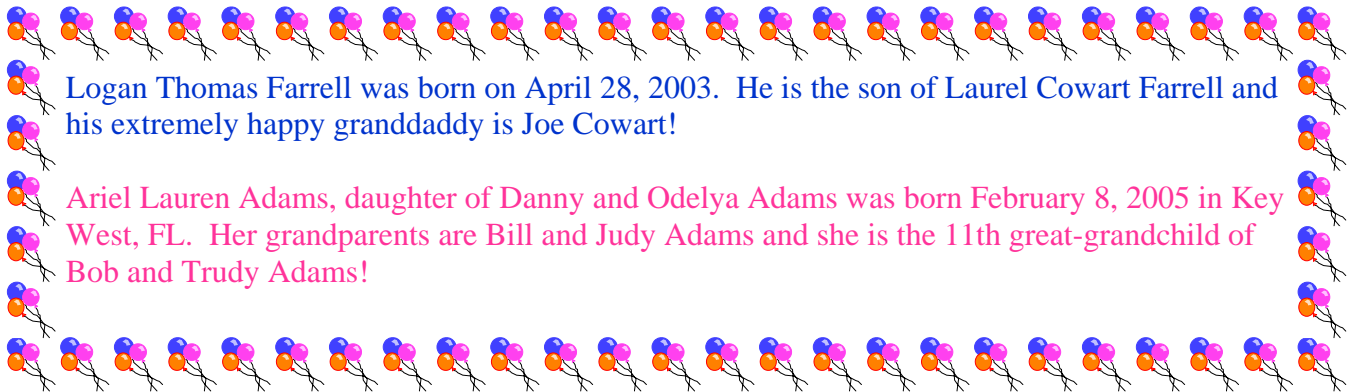

The Butterfly

Friday, August 20, 2004 dawned bright and clear at the beach on South Padre Island, Texas, the serenity marred only by rough currents. Rob and Mary Diaz of Huffman, Texas, and their ten-year-old twins, Ana and Zachary, had arrived the night before with the intention of soaking up the sand and surf during a mini-vacation. The festive and relaxed atmosphere turned more somber when a fellow vacationer became snared in the current and in need of assistance. Rob, exhibiting the unselfishness for which his life was known, went into the water with another bystander to rescue Daniel Martinez and his brother Hilberto. Both swimmers were rescued and the other rescuer also returned to shore safely. Rob did not. Even though many people mounted heroic efforts to save him, Rob died on that beautiful beach.

During the long days between Rob's death and his funeral a butterfly chrysalis was found on the front porch of Rob and Mary's home. A family member recognized it for what it was and explained its purpose to the children. Ana put the chrysalis in a jar in her room, waiting for the butterfly to emerge.

Rob's funeral mass was celebrated at St. Martha Catholic Church in Kingwood, Texas on August 25, 2004. Following the funeral the family returned home to find that a beautiful Monarch butterfly had emerged! Throughout that afternoon the butterfly clung to Ana's finger, returning even when she put it on the grass to take a picture. Finally, late in the day, the butterfly flew away, but the next morning it was seen on the milkweed plant outside the kitchen window. While we watched, it gently took flight and winged its way out of our sight.

While the butterfly has long been symbolic of death and resurrection, the timely appearance of this particular butterfly was a wondrous and visible sign to us that Rob's soul is safe and at peace and that God's comfort and love endure forever. While Rob's death has left an emptiness in all of us, we rest comfortably in the knowledge that we will see him again on another shore.

We love you, Rob.

Post Script: Rob Diaz has been nominated for the Carnegie Medal. This is an award that is given to a person whom the organization considers to be a "hero of civilization". It is awarded to those who selflessly attempt to help or rescue their fellow man, "in which no full measure of responsibility exists between the rescuer and the rescued". The candidate for such an award is a civilian who voluntarily risks his or her life to an extraordinary measure while saving or attempting to save the life of another person. We think Rob deserves this medal. But even if he doesn't receive it, it takes nothing away from his extraordinary sacrifice and act of love for his fellow man.
